SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

• Initiation Program Provincial Standard

- There are basic rules regarding the format and structure for ALL Cross-Ice games:
- Lightweight blue pucks will be used.
- Games will be played at one end of the rink, cross-ice blue line in.
- One official.
- 3-minute warmup.
- Nets should be 3'x 4'
- The Cross-ice game will be played 5 on 5 (skaters) and 1 goalie from each team or both may alter the format if the number of players on one or both teams is less than 10 skaters.
- Games are 2 x 24-minute periods. (Teams will switch ends after the first period)
- A face-off will take place at the start of every period only.
- Shift are 2 minutes, running time continuous play. (See below)
- Buzzer sounds once at the end of each 2-minute shift, however clock the clock continues to run.
- There shall be NO face off at the start of every shift. There are no icing or off-side calls.
- Score will NOT be kept
- Goalies may be switched at any time.
- Line matching must take place. The more advanced players from each team being matched against the more advanced players from the opposing team.



SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- **Initiation Program Provincial Standard (Continued)**
 - As identified by Hockey Canada as a core element at the Initiation category, one of the keys to improving the flow of each game and reducing the stoppages is to create continuous play, particularly on change of possession. These basic rules apply:
 - One coach from each team will assist in moving of bumpers/boards at the end of each shift.
 - A face-off will take place at the start of every period only. Between Shifts the Official will control the puck and keep the flow of the game moving by tossing it in an area where players from both teams can retrieve it.
 - There will be no stoppages in play during and between shifts; continuous play will be used. (Exception: Injury)
 - **Puck shot out of play:** Official blows whistle, defending team backs off and non-offending team gets possession.
 - **Goalie freezes puck:** Official- blows whistle, attacking team backs off and defending team gets possession.
 - **Goal Scored:** Official blows whistle, attacking team backs off and defending team gets possession.
 - **Regulations Concerning Initiation Program**
 - NO IP exhibition games or Tournaments will be sanctioned until December 1st annually.
 - All IP “play” until December 1 is practices.
 - The maximum number of games an Initiation Program (IP) team can play is **35** per season.



SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

• Novice Program Provincial Standard

- All Novice Hockey prior to January 1 must be half ice, practices and games. Please note that the SHA has chosen the January 1 date as a transition date from ½ ice to full ice. The other three Western Provinces will be ½ ice for the complete season.
- There are basic rules regarding the format and structure for Novice Half-Ice games:
- 3-minute warmup. (Home Team will use the game zone and the visiting team will use the skills zone)
- The half-ice game will be played 5 on 5 (skaters) and 1 goalie from each team or both may alter the format if the number of players on one or both teams is less than 10 skaters.
- Games are 2 x 24-minute periods. (Teams will switch ends after the first period)
- Officials will draw a dot in the middle of the game zone for all face-offs.
- Shift are 2 minutes, running time continuous play. (See below)
- Buzzer sounds once at the end of each 2-minute shift, however clock the clock continues to run.
- A face-off will take place at the start of every shift.
- There are no icing or off-side calls.
- Score will be kept; however, goals and assists will NOT be recorded.
- Goalies may not be pulled at any time.
- Line matching must take place. The more advanced players from each team being matched against the more advanced players from the opposing team.

- Novice Program Provincial Standard (continued)
 - **Continuous Play and Change of Possession:**
 - As identified by Hockey Canada as a core element at the Novice category, one of the keys to improving the flow of each game and reducing the stoppages is to create continuous play, particularly on change of possession. These basic rules apply:
 - One coach from each team will assist in moving of bumpers/boards at the end of each shift.
 - A face-off will take place at the start of every shift.
 - There will be no stoppages in play during shifts; continuous play will be used. (Exception: Injury)
 - **Puck shot out of play:** Official blows whistle, defending team backs off and non-offending team gets possession.
 - **Goalie freezes puck:** Official- blows whistle, attacking team backs off and defending team gets possession.

- **Novice Program Provincial Standard (continued)**

- **Penalties**

- The following guidelines apply to Minor Penalties during Novice Half-Ice Games:
- Standard: Delayed penalty procedures are followed. (NOTE: Goalie can't be pulled during delay)
- The official calling the penalty blows whistle, identifies offending player and penalty.
- Offending player is escorted to player bench by the official who called the penalty.
- The second official gives possession to the non-offending team. (Offending team must back-off)
- The offending player is eligible to return during the same shift if goal is scored by the non-offending team.

- **Regulations Concerning Novice Hockey**

- **All Games till December 31** Half-ice
- **Exhibition:** Start date November 15th
- **Tournament Games:** Start date December 1st
- **League Games:** Start date - Full Ice after January 1st
- **League Playoffs:** Must be Tournament style format over no more than two weekends.
- **Maximum Number of Games in a Season:** 45 games.



SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- Atom Hockey Proposal (2020/21)
 - **Hockey Canada Mandatory Elements of a Branch Atom Pathway**
 - No tryouts/evaluations during the first week of school in September
 - Must have a minimum of four skates/practices prior to formal evaluations starting
 - Tryouts must be a minimum of three formal sessions – recommend one skill session, one small area game and one formal scrimmage
 - There must be a development Phase following team selection and prior to the start of the Regular season
 - Playoffs must be a tournament style versus elimination rounds



SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- **Atom Hockey Proposal (2020/21) Continued**
 - **Creation of a Development Season**
 - The goal of Hockey Canada is at the younger ages such as IP through to Atom and even Pee Wee is to “front load” the season with practices and “back load” the season with games.
 - The creation of a “development” season should not be an issue if there are Regulations that dictate when teams can begin Exhibition Games, Tournament Games and League play.
 - There must be significant education of coaches and parents as to why these Regulations would be in place and the resources available to coaches to develop practice plans with an emphasis on skill development and specifically skating skills.
 - Start date for Exhibition Games, Tournaments and League Play is **November 15th**
 - **Regulation on the Number of Games that an Atom Team Can Play?**
 - Propose a **45-game cap on Exhibition, Tournament and League Games**
 - **What type of Discipline Must be Imposed if a Team Exceeds the Game Cap?**
 - Coach Suspension
 - MHA is Sanctioned – cannot host Tournaments; teams not permitted in Provincial Playoffs



SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- Atom Hockey Proposal (2020/21) Continued
 - **Atom League Playoffs must be conducted in a Tournament Style**
 - Make it a Regulation and can be held over a maximum of two weekends
 - **Use of Full Time Goalies**
 - Yes, full time goalies would be permitted however all kids who wish to play should be encouraged to try goal.



SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- Atom Hockey Proposal (2020/21) Continued
- **Novice/Atom Tiering/Carding**
- Geographic Sub-Divisions Regina, Saskatoon, Prince Albert and Moose Jaw are all closed from a League perspective. Teams from outside these Sub-Divisions are not allowed to compete within their Leagues.
- Geographic Sub-Divisions Regina, Saskatoon, Prince Albert and Moose Jaw would be allowed to have three tiers of Hockey within the Novice and Atom age groups.
- All other Minor Hockey Associations who choose to tier their Novice and Atom teams would be allowed a maximum of two tiers within the age groups and the following conditions would apply;
- Players on the Tier I teams cannot be registered on carded teams.
- Players on the Tier I teams must be residents of the sponsoring centre of the team or their residence must be closer to the sponsoring center than any other Novice/Atom team.
- There must be a minimum of twelve players on the Tier I team(s).
- Evaluations/Tryouts for Tiered Novice/Atom teams will take place no earlier than the 3rd weekend in September.
- All Novice/Atom League playoffs will be conducted in a tournament format over two weekends at the end of March.



SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- Atom Hockey Proposal (2020/21) Continued
 - The following would apply to the carded teams in Novice/Atom annually;
 - Application for a carded team would be November 15th
 - Deadline to finalize Registration of a carded team is December 1
 - There would be four “carded” weekends through the season which would result in no League play scheduled for Novice/Atom throughout the province. The four weekends are;
 - 2nd Weekend of December (for Novice this would require ½ ice tournaments/game play)
 - 3rd weekend January
 - 3rd weekend February
 - 1st weekend April
 - The maximum number of players that can be registered on a carded team is 19.
 - There are no affiliations between Novice and Atom carded teams.
 - All games players play in carded team play will not apply to the maximum game limit established for both age divisions.
 - There are no exceptions to the carded weekends.

SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- Male Midget Proposal
- **Midget AAA**
- Changes to take place for the 2020/21 season
- All current teams are removed from the SMAAAHL
- Like what took place in the Fall of 2018 for Female Midget AAA, any Minor Hockey Association can apply to the SHA to host a Midget AAA team by October 1, 2019
- The Committee will review applications and submit a recommendation to the SHA Board of Directors for up to a maximum of twelve teams
- Male Midget AAA application criteria;
 - MHA must have an established Male Minor Program
 - MHA must demonstrate they have local Coaching Resources
 - MHA must provide billeting options for males including a billeting coordinator which must be named in the proposal
 - MHA must provide a named educational Consultant along with including a written working agreement with a local high school
 - MHA must also be able to sustain a Midget AA program for the availability of affiliates
 - Must be able to sustain a team of a minimum of 18 skaters and 2 goaltenders
 - Players will be able to be drawn from the entire Province
 - Players of Bantam age will not be eligible

SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- Male Midget Proposal (Continued)
- **Midget AA**
- Changes to take place for the 2020/21 season
- Like what took place in the Fall of 2018 for Female Midget AAA, any Minor Hockey Association can apply to the SHA to host a Midget AA team by October 1, 2019
- The Committee will review applications and submit a recommendation to the SHA Board of Directors for a range of fifteen to twenty teams
 - Note: The number of teams is dependent upon membership feedback on the creation of a Provincial 15-year-old league
- MHA must demonstrate they have enough local Coaching Resources
- Must be able to sustain a team of a minimum of 17 skaters and 2 goaltenders
- Players will have to first try out first for the nearest AA team of their residence except for Regina, Saskatoon, Prince Albert and Moose Jaw which are closed.
- Players of Bantam age will not be eligible



SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- Male Midget Proposal (Continued)
- **Midget 15-Year-Old Provincial League**
- Potential New League to take place for the 2020-21 season. **Decision will be based upon feedback at March 2019 Zone Meetings**
- Like what took place in the Fall of 2018 for Female Midget AAA, any Minor Hockey Association can apply to the SHA to host a Midget 15-Year-Old team by October 1, 2019
- The Committee will review applications and submit a recommendation to the SHA Board of Directors for a range of six to eight teams
- Like the Female and Male Midget AAA process the following also must be included in the application
 - MHA must have an established Male Minor Program
 - MHA must demonstrate they have enough local Coaching Resources
 - MHA must provide billeting options for males including a billeting coordinator which must be named in the proposal
 - MHA must provide a named educational Consultant along with a including a written working agreement with a local high school
 - Must be able to sustain a team of a minimum of 17 skaters and 2 goaltenders
 - Players will have to first try out first for the nearest Midget 15 team of their residence except for Regina and Saskatoon which are closed.
 - Players of Bantam age will not be eligible



SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- Accelerated Player Process

- The Saskatchewan Hockey Association (SHA) programs place a focus on the development of players within their specific age group, and not to displace players from their age Division by facilitating the movement of underage players. Underage players will only be considered if they are deemed to be an “Exceptional Player”.
- **Only second year bantam aged players** will be considered for acceleration to the highest level of Midget hockey (AAA). There will be no acceleration permitted for Bantam aged players to Midget AA.
- In order to be considered for “Exceptional Player” status, applications must be submitted to the Saskatchewan Hockey Association on or before **July 1**.
- Applicants must fill out, in its entirety, the Player Acceleration Application Package and provide all the necessary documentation requested;
- Applications will be evaluated by the Saskatchewan Minor Female Development Committee, in consultation with the SHA staff;
- No underage players will be granted a second tryout at the Midget AAA division.
- Decisions will be communicated to the player and applicable Host MHA(s) / Program in writing on or before August 1.
- A \$250.00 non-refundable Application Fee must accompany all applications.



SHA Minor/Female Development Committee

- Accelerated Player Process (Continued)
- Applications must include:
 - Personal Information;
 - Playing History (including statistics from the past three seasons);
 - Personal Resume; it should include academic standing, athletic achievements, leadership activities, community service, other extra-curricular activities (sports, clubs, etc.), academic awards and work experience (if any);
 - Personal Response (outlined on the following page);
 - Current Coach recommendation (utilizing the attached form);
 - Current Teacher (or School Administrator) recommendation (utilizing the attached form).
- How Selections will be made:
 - Applicants will be evaluated by SHA;
 - Applications will be reviewed on their individual merit; taking into account the physical, emotional and social maturity of the athlete;
 - Feedback will be collected from the players Resident MHA or the MHA last registered with;
 - Applicants will be notified of the decision on or before August 1.

Hockey Day in Saskatchewan

Registration Regulations/Playing Rule Regulations

- Potential Regulations we wish to have feedback on from the membership;
 - Mandatory use of helmets by coaches in all on-ice events
 - Sanctioned Exhibition Games to be counted towards Suspensions if the game has been sanctioned prior to committing the offense resulting in a suspension
- Playing Rule Suggestions
 - A team who is killing a penalty not being able to ice the puck
 - A player is injured and the opposing player receives a five minute major and a game misconduct. The injured player is not allowed back on the ice until the five minute major is served. If he returns to the ice prior to the penalty being served, a penalty given to the team – i.e.: bench minor



Registration Regulations/Playing Rule Regulations

- Minor Provincial Playoffs
 - Potential Change to the Playoff Series format. Incorporate a modified Best of Three Series. – If teams split the first two games of a Series, a third Mini-Game is played immediately following Game two. The Mini-Game is a ten-minute game and if the Series isn't settled then, then sudden victory is played afterwards to decide.
- Minor Regulations
 - The handout represents a potential new outline of the Minor Regulations incorporating items from within the Sask Female Development Model; IP and Novice Game Structure.
